Sitting Pretty: Stock Up on Premium Dining Chairs

- Don't assume everything has to match. Surrounding your dining table with different chair styles—some oak, some metal, some dark, some light—can create a charmingly eclectic effect. Just be sure the chairs are all the same seat height to keep guests on an even keel.
- Get the height right. As a general rule of thumb, you should have at least a foot of space to spare between the seat and the top of the table. Standard dining chairs are usually between 18"-19", while a typical dining table is 29"-30".
- Choose a dining table first. This makes it much easier to determine how high the chairs will need to be and what style will look best.
- Consider function, then looks. Cutting-edge, contemporary styles are growing in popularity for modern kitchens, but make sure they're as sturdy as they are snazzy. A well-built dining chair should offer heft and stability, with steady, non-wobbling legs.
- Arms or not? This choice is based purely on personal preference. Some dining chairs are designed with armrests, while "side chairs" have no arms.
- Need an extra layer of comfort? Upholstered chairs cradle you and your guests with cushioned padding, encouraging you to linger long after the last plates have been cleared.

- What's the height of the bar or counter you're furnishing? Standard "bar height" stools are 30" high, and "counter height" stools are 24"-26" high. Also consider the total width of the space. For stools that have arms or are equipped with a swiveling function, you'll need to allow for more room in between each one.

• How many guests should it accommodate? Pub tables range from small, intimate bistro sizes (for 2-4 people) to roomier 30" tables that have plenty of room for 4 guests to large 42" tables.
